



THE BENEFIT OF TREES FOR STORMWATER RUNOFF

Trees provide all of us with numerous benefits in our everyday lives such as producing oxygen for us to breath, consuming the carbon dioxide that we exhale and providing cool shade when the sun gets too hot. But did you know that trees play an im-portant role in helping manage stormwater runoff in our commu-nities? Here is a short list of some of the highlights:

- 1) Trees intercept precipitation and release that water slowly through evapotranspiration back into the atmosphere or through infiltration into the soil. Mature conifer trees can soak up between 50 and 100 gallons of stormwater during a storm event.
- 2) Tree roots hold the soil in place and over time enhance the ability of the tree and the soil to clean stormwater runoff by removing unhealthy pollution.
- 3) Not only do they provide shade, improve air, water and soil quality, but trees improve property values, attract new busi-nesses and improve our mental health and well being.





Phases and funding

Phase 1 was recently completed. This \$3.65 million phase provides a connection to Goodman Road and the extension of Long Fiber Road with a new bridge over Ahtanum Creek. Phase 1 provides a roundabout that will connect to Phase 2.

Phase 2 – Preliminary design and environment (NEPA) process is underway. This \$17.95 million portion

will connect US 97/Main Street to Phase 1 providing the critical link to Ahtanum Road. The City is currently seeking funding for the final design, environmental permitting, right-of-way, and construction.

Phase 3 – The South Union Gap Interchange project will provide two additional ramps to complete the interchange. There will be access to and from Union Gap from I-82 and US 97 from all directions and reduce traffic at the Valley Mall Boulevard Interchange. This phase is fully funded with construction scheduled to begin in 2019.
